



Migration Motivation for and duration of migration


Environment

Primary, secondary, and tertiary education rates; Parental involvement and expectation for child's education

What is the impact of enumerator recruitment on data quality? Focus on enumerator recruitment and survey outcomes

Early Childhood Investment on higher education outcomes

What are barriers to take-up for higher education? Promising cash transfer conditional on college attendance, ECD program, information on subsidies

Grouped Grants on Livelihoods

Can group grants increase financial well-being through economies of scale? Cash grants for productive livelihood given to ICM participants either individually or groups of 2-4



Aspirations on economic well being

Can stating aspirations improve economic mobility? Light-touch intervention showing aspirational video, setting collective and individual goals
