  - Developed a research initiative to support several LAC Ministries of Education in the design and evaluation of policies to provide educational services during the COVID-19 pandemic.

# Regional Director for Latin America and the Caribbean (LAC)

- Leads IPA programs in the LAC region: Manages a budget of 7 to 11 million USD annually, approximately 140 full time staff, and a network of more than a 100 academics and partners.
