Community Extension Agents Update




AFTER FIVE MONTHS OF CEA SERVICE

Under the DIRTS Community Extension Agents (CEA) Program, selected farmers have received 12,785 need sensitive extension messages in video and audio format. In the month of August 2,424 messages were delivered.

The seven (7) main messages delivered in August include; messages on Integrated Pest & Diseases Management, Intercropping, and Mulching, Composting and Organic Fertilizer Application. The rest were Mixed Farming, Labor Management, Soil Conservation & Management and Crop Rotation. A greater number of farmers however revealed that these messages were new to them.

Messages on Mulching & Crop Rotation

For instance, almost **80 percent** of farmers who received the messages on mulching, composting and organic fertilizer application indicated that the content of the messages were new to them. Eighty three (**83 percent**) said, they did not practice the prescribed messages in the last farming season. The message on mulching centered on soil condition improvement through application of organic matter such as cow dung or other domestic animal droppings. The message on crop rotation (growing of crops in succession on the same piece of land) was new to **75 percent** of farmers, and was not practiced by **77 percent** the farmers during the last farming

FEATURED ACTIVITY: DEMO FIELD IN TOHANAAYILI

The DIRTS project has been delivering extension messages on maize production to farmers under the CEA component of the project since April 2014. To complement lessons learned by farmers through the maize extension messages and demonstrate new technologies in mixed farming of local staple foods, a demo field was established at Tohanaayili (one of DIRTS intervention communities) located in Central Gonja district of northern region of

Ghana. The demonstration farm on which improved and best agronomic practices of soya, maize, groundnut and cowpea are applied is currently serving as the source of DIRTS extension videos footage. These extension videos will be used for farmers' training in the 2015 cropping season. Labor work on the demonstration field was done by farmers in the community under the technical direction of Kenneth Obodai, a Ministry of Food and Agriculture (MoFA) Agricultural Extension Agent (AEA) from the Central Gonja district. The demonstration farm received constant monitoring and in the month of August, the DIRTS implementation Coordinator, Elettra Legovini, together with Kenneth Oboddai, MoFA AEAs in Central Gonja district, embarked on monitoring visit to the demo site.
